

### A Journey to Die For

#### A JOURNEY TO DIE FOR By Nadine Trees Nehring Published by Wolfmont Press 275 pages

"Often I know my characters better than I know myself," Radine Trees Nehring chuckled. "I do such deep research on them that I sometimes discover what I really think."

Nehring is a five-foot two-inch

mass of sparkling, smiling energy, usually wearing a hat so she's easy to pick out in a crowd.

A Journey to Die For is the sixth book in the 'To Die For' award-winning mystery series. We join popular ama-

teur sleuth, Carrie McCrite, and retired police-officer husband, Henry King, in the first chapter as they board a train. They're taking a day trip on an historic excursion from Springdale, through places like Frog Bayou, to Van Buren, Arkansas.

Intrigue starts early when they realize a local TV station is doing a piece on the tourist attraction. Carrie's razor-sharp intuition detects a couple of the passengers toward the front of the car who seem to dodge the camera, and we're off - through river walks, nail-biting police chases, quaint

restaurants, and hair-raising shootouts in antique shops with priceless treasures. Her peers at the Killer Nashville Writer's Conference voted it their top prize in 2010, the Silver Falchion Award.

A true love of the Arkansas Ozarks with it's beautiful scenery and lush landscape combined with civil war history and warm communities full of genuine folks keeps her writing passion alive.

She and photographer husband,
John, lived in
Tulsa and started
traveling to Arkansas for weekends,
then bought vacation property near
Gravette (outside
Bentonville) before they moved

there full time.

Though the books are fiction, her readers can trust the land-marks and historical information as a guidebook. They have everything but maps.

Her fans fall into several categories. At a book fair in Texas, an English teacher brought her students with instructions to pick a book for the class to study – and they picked her book.

Another fan who wrote on her blog asked when the next 'To Die For' book would be out. She needed a "Carrie fix" But these aren't just sweet little mystery cozies for women. Since the third book in the series (*A Treasure to Die For*, 2005) where Carrie's husband, Henry, became a POV character and contrast to Carrie's bubbly personality, she's gained male fans.

And Nehring thinks it's a happy accident that she didn't describe Carrie in greater detail. "Women from 40 to 80 identify with her," she laughed, teal blue eyes twinkling beneath the brim of her straw bowler.

Wound through the plots and characters are Nehring's own strong values. She's convinced we're here to help others and is determined people will triumph amid the pressures and challenges. They're not perfect and they've suffered. She deals with who they are, what they've done, right and wrong. But she wants them to gain strength and for evil

## 3 SITES TO BOOKMARK

Every year, Writer's Digest comes out with its list of 101 Best Sites for Writers. Every year, like a good little lemming, I read over the list and check out the ones that I haven't looked at in the past. Some I find useful and those I bookmark. With that said, here are what I consider to be the top three websites that writers should bookmark along with a few reasons why.

1. Preditors & Editors – http://www.pred-ed.com: The Preditors & Editors site is maintained by David Kuzminski. He started the site in 1997 with the purpose of providing writers with contacts and information as they seek to market their work for publication. Along the way, he also provides information about scams and unscrupulous agents and editors

2. Writer Beware – http://
www.writerbeware.com: Writers
Victoria Strauss and Ann ("A.C.")
Crispin maintain this site along
with Richard White. Specifically,
they are the Committee on Writing Scams for the Science Fiction
& Fantasy Writers of America.
Their information, however, is
useful for writers regardless of
genre. For example, they also receive sponsorships from other
writers' organizations, such as the
Mystery Writers of America. If a
writer has a specific question

about a publisher, editor, or agent, she can contact Writer Beware directly and they will look into the complaint. They have a blog (Writer Beware® Blogs, http://accrispin.blogspot.com) that is frequently updated.

3. Writer's Market Online – http://www.writersmarket.com: There is obvious value in this site in that it has an extensive market database. Writers who are not familiar with the site don't know

### **VOWELCABULARY**

As wordsmiths, we think we're soooooo smart showing off our big list of words when we write and when we speak. Riiiiight.

Perhaps you suffer from a similar dreaded disease I do: distended vowelcabulary syndrome. It recurs every so often, usually when I'm extra fatigued and I make the mistake of thinking I can still carry on a normal conversation.

Not so.

A couple of

nights ago, hurrying to speak to my handsome Irishman during a commercial when the Thunder and Mavericks took a time-out, I experienced a relapse. I wanted to share how good his mom was doing with her rehab following hip surgery. I'd been to her house earlier in the day to catch up her laundry and housework and noticed a major difference from the previous week.

"Really, your mom's walking is improving dramastically."

He looked at me, a bushy eyebrow cocked, making sure he had heard me correct. What had I said? *Dramastically? Really? Not dramatically or drastically, but dramastically? Good grief.* And I had said it out loud, in front of the fella I tease

relentlessly when his tongue tangles around a word. It started shortly after we were married and he tried to explain a great western he'd been watching. "This father and his daughtee..." Well, I lost it. Here's this big lug of a blue collar guy telling me a tough western

tale and he says "daughtee" in-

stead of "daughter." I never did hear the rest of his movie explanation and eleven years later, all either of us has to say "daughtee," and we both giggle until we can't breathe.

The truth is I'm usually the worst, though, inventing all kinds of words without trying. As writers we can take advantage of this type of malady when needing an eccentric character who might be a bit off, or who can't quite remember the right word. And of course, I wouldn't be a good doc if I didn't remind you to use those new words sparingly or else they will lose their effectiveness.

So don't be afraid to use humor or a little unique twist with your word choices. You never

This past year was my first time to be involved in a writer's group. A friend learned that I liked to write, so she invited me to go with her to attend a Writers of the Purple Sage meeting in Woodward. It's been great getting to know each other as we've traveled to and from the monthly meetings.

I'd wanted to be in a writer's group for many years but, because of my husband's work (and his wanderlust), it had not been possible. It might also have had to do with the fact that I didn't have the nerve to join one...maybe...a

little bit. Because of that, it helped that I got to attend with someone the group knew so they wouldn't eat me alive, or whatever it was I thought they were going to do to me. Not only did they not eat me alive, but they were quite encouraging. They wanted to listen to what I wrote and responded by appreciating the good points and kindly suggesting changes that might help my writ-

ing. They also listened to my comments about their writing.

Then the day came when my friend was not able to attend one of the meetings and I decided to go on my own. I wondered if the group would treat me the same when my friend wasn't with me, since I was a newcomer. They did. I had a blast and felt right at

home.

I appreciate the way WOPS sets up their meetings. There's a brief time before and after the meeting for visiting. Old and new business is discussed, either a member or a guest presents a lesson, members read their

assignments from the previous month, report submissions and acceptances, and anyone who has something they'd like critiqued may read that piece to the group. I found myself working to get some writing done so I could report it at the next meeting.

My friend also invited me to attend my first writer's conference. I knew even if the conference turned out to be a dud, the trip itself would be fun. What a double blessing to find out that the conference was also great!

So, what's the use of a writer's group? For me it has been to help thrust me back into writing after a very dry period. I've gained new writing friends, I've been able to focus on my writing more, and I have people to whom I'm accountable for the work that I'm doing. I realize not all writer's groups are created equal. I guess some are probably the wicked stepmothers of writer's groups. I'm just glad the one I got hooked up with is the fairy godmother of writer's groups.

Whether you're a new writer, or a seasoned writer who hasn't had the opportunity or inclination to be in a writer's group, I would encourage you to get involved in one this year. From hearing people talk at last year's OWFI conference, I think you'll find most groups to be the fairy godmother type. Thanks, Writers of the Purple Sage, for the jump start you've given my writing. It's been a good year. I look forward to many more.

explores ways to craft a satisfying psychological mystery. Attendees will learn how to create vivid, fully-rounded characters; moreover, they'll learn that in the best mysteries, crime stems from strong emotions, and strong emotions stem from conflict. Kind of like life.

We'll also explore such topics as the importance of a strong, relatable protagonist; how to build a compelling, credible "world" in which the story takes place; and how to mine your own thoughts, feelings and experiences to enrich the inner lives of your characters.

#### **Building Your Freelance Portfolio** (Writing for Magazines & Newspapers 101)

This presentation studies the basics of freelancing—how to write articles for magazines, newspapers and websites. It targets writers new to this arena. It shows how to identify markets, how to realize your own specialties, how to structure a magazine query, how to come up with ideas, how to resell ideas, and more. Handouts provided.

Novelist, screenwriter, playwright, Tom was Head Writer/Showrunner of



the classic CBS series, Murder, She Wrote, for which he wrote 24 episodes. Edgar & Emmynominated, Tom has written 9 TV series pilots, 100 episodes both comedy and





to be punished. It's moral entertainment her loyal fans no doubt are hungry for.

Salted through the pages are word treasures that make us laugh . . new words like 'Eggsactly' and old-timey terms like 'golly.'

"I don't like coarse language," she said, "but I love an expression I recently found for Henry - 'Oh Blast!' He's a policeman for pete's sake, and he has to talk tough sometimes," she laughed.

Nehring's 'voice' is so personal and subtle it's like chatting with a friend. Usually a reader has to take a running leap to enter a story, but with no effort I climbed into the old rail car with Carrie and Henry.

Nehring is beginning to collect a pile of awards. Being nominated for a Macavity for her first mystery, *A Valley to Die For* (2002) must have been overwhelming. By now she has over 25 – certificates, trophies, and even keys to a few cities. She won 1st prize in the OWFI Mystery/Suspense category for this book, *A Journey to Die For*, in 2009, before it was sold and published. And right after winning the Silver Falchion Award in 2010, she was inducted into the Arkansas Hall of Fame in 2011.

Nehring makes connecting with the people, either in print or in person, look easy but it's a result of years of professional success. She first wrote essays for magazines, then articles as a reporter for fifteen years where she developed a network of trusted experts she relies on to breathe reality into her plots and characters. Overlapping that, she had a radio show for ten years, which taught her how to listen. Her time behind the microphone gives her a natural grace with audiences and issues.

"But I write mysteries full time now," she proudly announced. Each book takes about a year and a half. Radine and John, since he's retired, make an adventure out of the research. John, an accountant and small business owner, keeps all the records and, I'm told, can solve nearly any problem. I've also heard he may be working on a mystery story of his own.

"I have to have a special feeling about 'the place' for a story first," she admitted. "There are lots of nice places but it has to speak to me before I can write about it." Then the history of the area is always the springboard. When she gets that far, the characters just seem to show up.

The seventh book in the series, *A Fair to Die For*, will be out this May and is centered around the War Eagle Mill and Craft Fair. It's one of the oldest annual fairs in the Ozarks – 60 years. War Eagle Mill, originally built in 1838, was burned down during the Civil War but was rebuilt and is still in operation today.

Loyal 'To Die For' fans will be delighted to know the next adventure is beginning to swirl deep within her creative juices.
