

2018 Keynote Speaker Michael Dahl

Michael Dahl is the author of more than 200 books for children and young adults. He has won the AEP Distinguished Achievement Award three times for his nonfiction. a Teachers' Choice award from Learning magazine, a Seal of Excellence from the Creative Child Awards, several Moms' Choice awards, the Moonbeam Award. and had been short listed twice by the Agatha Awards for his middlegrade mysteries. He has written *The* Everything Kid's Joke Book and Gotcha Covered! (with Kathleen Baxter) on nonfiction books that get kids excited about reading. His Finnegan Zwake mystery series published by Simon & Schuster won rave reviews. The Chicago Tribune called it a "wisecracking riot" and "golden!"

He is the author of the bestselling *Bedtime for Batman* and *Goodnight, Football* picture books. His *Library of Doom* adventure series has been the number one hi-lo series read in US schools for years. His latest picture book *Sweet Dreams, Supergirl* was recently reviewed by *Booklist* as "a perfect introductory graphic novel for picture-book readers," a guaranteed bedtime favorite for



your little supersleeper," and "as admirably diverse as the rest of the series."

Dahl has spoken at schools, libraries, and conferences across the US, including ALA, Texas Library Association, the Tulsa Reading Council, Oklahoma Young Writers Association, the Massachusetts School Library Association, the Bank Street School, and at the New York Public Library. He currently lives in Minneapolis, Minnesota, in a haunted house.

What to Wear

Meet your President - Elect: Staci Mauney




Currently the OWFI Conference Chair for 2018, Staci Mauney holds

and business processes, systems, and how to books.


What's the best writing-related advice you've ever received? Just write! Keep writing and you'll get better and better at it.

"Who's that laughing?"

It wasn't unusual to hear people laughing at our annual Tyson Foods company gathering, but this laugh? It was thunderous. "It's Dusty Richards."

Neal, my husband, pointed to a table at least a football field away from us. "He works for field services. He also gives the farm report for channel 40/29."

I walked closer to get a better look. Amid the crowd of people a giant of a man wearing a white cowboy hat regaled the group with his stories. That was the last time I saw him at Tyson Foods functions. Even so, he was hard to forget.

A couple of years later my friend, Lois Spoon, joined a critique group and asked me to come along with her. Imagine my surprise when I walked into the room, and there sat Dusty. He stood and offered his huge hand. "Welcome to the group, Buddy."

He's a writer? Who knew?

I returned each week and soaked up all he had to say. I became one of *Dusty's Girls*, a moniker given to us at conferences. When someone asked, "Who is she?" The answer was, "Oh, that's one of Dusty's girls."

Many writers basked in the dynamic energy of this man. And what a mentor! He warned us to avoid the words was and that. Oh how I struggled, and still do, to avoid those words. Dusty also advised us against burying the dialogue, and for gosh sakes, watch for those prairie dogs, the repetitive words continually popping up, such as the aforementioned was and that.

Dusty never allowed timidity. If anyone stood at the door of novel writing to intimidated to enter, he'd put his virtual boot between the dismayed writer's shoulder blades and give a big push. He did that for me. And when I stumbled in the publishing arena he was there to pick me up, brush me off, and lead the way.

Dusty got me my first agent. At a conference he walked up to me and said, "Hey, Buddy, send your manuscript to Terry Burns. I've already told him about you." I did, Terry accepted, and boom, I had an agent. I can only imagine what Dusty said to Terry about me. Whatever it was, Terry took me on.

Almost everyone who knows anything about Dusty knows he was a prolific writer, a multiple Spur winner, a licensed auctioneer, a rodeo announcer, and one of his books was made into an award-winning movie. But over the past twenty years, I learned other things about him, such as his love for trout fishing. At conferences and the yearly Writer's Christmas party held in our home, he and Neal would go off in a corner and talk about the fish they'd caught since the last time they'd spoken. Dusty's was always as big as his arms could span. They'd share their favorite springs and secret fishing spots. On many occasions he advised us about investments and how to prepare for retirement. He was also a great businessman.

He really enjoyed a good joke. Many times he'd sit next to me, lower his head in a conspiratorial manner, and murmur an antic before palming the table and exploding with laughter. My ears still ring.



When I think of Dusty, I see him as a roaring fire in the hearth. It didn't matter where he stood or sat, people were drawn to him. Like a fire, his light illuminated us about writing. He warmed us with his generosity and acceptance.

As I write this, I still can't believe he has ridden off into the sunset. But he lives on in all of us who have enjoyed the privilege of being mentored by him. Hundreds of us—perhaps thousands. And even though I'll never stand in his giant shadow on this earth again or delight in his bear hug of a laugh, I am and will always be a *Dusty's girl*.

You can send direct messages to other members, like our dedicated board members.


There is the option to send documents and images via the application as well.


