# WHY STRUCTURE MATTERS

The greatest divide in the writing world is not between those who publish and those who don't—it's between those who actually finish a book and those who don't.

Those in the first category have a decent chance of publishing. Those in the latter category have none—and are far more common. Starting a book is easy, but too many people bog down and quit before they finish or before the work is of publishable quality.

Why?

I'm sure there are as many reasons as there are writers, but one of the most prominent causes of failure in the writing world is a failure of process. People start writing because they think this is going to be fun, and writing will be a big improvement over their current iob...and then it turns out to be hard work. They start in a blaze of inspiration, without planning or outlining or fleshing out the story. Pages fly like dust in a whirlwind...until they exhaust the initial idea and have no idea what happens next.

So they stop writing.

There are many institutional, snooty, or romantic ideas that cause people to write without plan or process, but there's nothing inherently more literary about writing from "inspiration"—which

generally means putting down the first idea that pops into your head. Why would you think that's the best you can do? Too often your subconscious dredges something up, not because it's fresh or perfect for your story, but because you've seen it before. Or read it before.


I despair when I hear people at conferences tell me how their characters "came alive and took control of the book." They usually smile with delight because they think this means they're very creative. I do not smile, because I know this means they lack discipline and are unlikely to finish anything publishable. Look, your characters are fictional. They do not "come to life" (though I hope you will bring them to life). Writing anything as large and complex as a novel requires application and discipline. Letting your characters run amok may evidence a great imagination, but it may also indicate a lack of work ethic necessary to keep your project on track. Your characters' undirected meanderings will likely be less entertaining to others than they are to you.

I've also heard people talking with pride about being "pantsers," that is, people who don't plan but simply write from the seat of their pants. This movement is emblematic of the idea that writing is a lark. Pantsers want to do the fun stuff, but skip hard work like outlining, which is why I have rarely seen a major book published by an actual pantser. (Don't be misled by stuff writers say in interviews. I spent a memorable lunch helping an author outline his novel, only to hear him later claim on television that he never outlines.) Your goal is not selfentertainment. Your goal is to

produce something someone else will want to read.

In the next issue, I'm going to outline the fundamental elements of story structure as best I can given a limited word count. In the following issue, I will discuss how to turn those fundamentals into a workable outline, something that will not consume too much time but will make it about a thousand times more likely that you will finish a book of sufficient quality to attract readers and publishers.

Even if you pride yourself on being a pantser, give it a look. You never know. I've been teaching this method for many years now, and I'm proud to say that more than two dozen of my students have gone on to become published writers. This may be the simple idea that transforms your writing and makes your writing goals a reality.

My kiddos are pretty decent readers. In fact, they were such good readers in elementary school that we (I'm speaking as an elementary librarian now!) had trouble finding something that was appropriate, interesting and challenging all at the same time. Then along comes Marilyn Boone's Heartstrings.

Heartstrings is the sweet love story of a budding musician, her violin teacher and the star of the football

team. If this sounds like the making of a remarkable love story that's appropriate for all ages of readers, you are exactly right.

We meet Anna at the Samaritan Center, a place very dear to her heart, as she's volunteering her time weekly. E.C., the star quarterback intrudes upon her volunteer time, appearing arrogant, self-centered and only there because their history teacher is offering bonus points for volunteering. Soon, though, Anna will see a different side of E.C. as he befriends her younger brother. Anna gains confidence in herself as she befriends E.C. and confidence in her musical abilities through her instructor, Louisa, a mysterious figure also prominent at the Samaritan Center.

So many readers of all ages will find the beauty in unlikely friendships and in bonds that bind a family in Heartstrings. Long after you've finished the last page, you'll think back on this story with a satisfied smile.

# **SOCIAL MEDIA & BOOK PROMOTION**

# Recently, I came across an article about social media faux pas that need to stop.

I found myself agreeing with most of the points the article was making, including; not announcing Grandma's death before all the family has been notified, not hanging your dirty laundry out to dry in the not so fresh air of social media land, and of course, not post pictures of your friends in unflattering positions. Then, I was stopped in my tracks as I read, "Selling any type of product," being described as one of the most annoying social media faux pas people make.

What? Surely, they don't mean me! People love hearing about every single detail of my books...right? The hard truth is, while people do love hearing about our books, they don't like hearing about them every day, numerous times a day, every hour on the hour. I believe social media is one of the best (and cheapest) ways to help spread the word about our writing careers, but we have to remember to exercise balance so we don't annoy the very people we're trying to reach.

Here are some tips to help you utilize social media without

utilize social media without ostracizing yourself in the process.

1. Pick a promotion day (or two). Every Wednesday and Saturday

Every Wednesday and Saturday I put up a single post promoting one of my books. I include the tag line, title, price, keyword hashtags, and then a link to the book on Amazon. I try to post

- after 8:00 pm, because that is when most people are on social media. I never say, "Buy my books," but I post it as a simple reminder that I have a book for sale. Hopefully, the reminder will make someone think, "Hey, I've been wanting to read that. Let me download it now, so I'll have it to read before bed." When you promote your book every day, multiple times a day, people start to scroll past your posts just as they do advertisements.
- Do not private message your sales pitch. I recently took a very unscientific Facebook poll on how much people hate this tactic. Let me tell you, they hate it a lot. It's one thing to put on your status that you have a book for sale, it's another thing entirely to use private messenger to try and sell your book. People find it invasive, some to the extent they block the offending party. Although we know nothing is truly private on social media, people still see PM as a safe place and most do not appreciate this approach.
- 3. **Develop a street team**. Create a closed group of "fans" who are willing to help you spread the word when you have a new book release. Now, keep in mind, your street team will only be as engaged with others as you are with them. If a person joins a street team and gets nothing out of it, then they aren't going to visit often. Give them secret sneak peeks, have them help pick character names, have little giveaways, let them BETA read, give them one on one time... even when you don't have a new book ready for release. Then when you're ready for your

- book release, you ask them to help spread the word and they do, which carries your news much farther than you could do alone. Word of mouth is the BEST form of advertisement.
- Make it personal. Social media is the best way for our readers to get to know us. To get to know that behind the stories, there is a real person—someone trying to make ends meet, or send their kid to college, or just trying to get their kid to eat anything but macaroni and cheese. Let your readers get to know you. Hardly a book signing goes by that someone doesn't ask me about my family, my latest trip, or best of all my current work in progress. We are able to laugh together and talk like old friends, because they have gotten to know me via social media. And ves, they are more likely to buy a book from a person they feel they know (and like). So be accessible, be kind, be gracious and your social media friends will follow suit.

Social media is a powerful tool in your promotion arsenal and with any powerful tool, using it wisely will result in wonderful opportunities.

# WATCHING YOUR LANGUAGE: STYLES

Among the horrors that make a writer quake in submitting a manuscript is making a mistake in grammar or spelling.

Agents, editors, contest judges—all will declare that the first such error means a guaranteed trip to the waste basket with the whole thing. Whole thing being your months, maybe years of work.

That's bad enough, of course, but there are subtler thorny gates to pass as well. You may have met the red mark of "word choice" or "awkward" from an instructor or judge. At a recent Rose State Short Course on Writing, more than one presenter urged hiring an editor before submitting our work for publication.

And here is where the dictum of "Know your audience" thunders righteously.

Those of us who write for hire must be particularly aware of our client's style preference, which can be idiosyncratic, to say the least. Style books, guides, and particularly company or organization preferences can vary to the point of hot disagreement. A scholarly or professional guide like *The Chicago Manual of Style* can be at odds with the *Associated Press Stylebook* on a point here or there. The serial comma, often called the Oxford comma, is a stellar example. Certain scientific, medical, or other special

dictionaries and stylebooks might also have their sway over your work. Magazine editors will sometimes cite their preference in their guidelines for writers. Be glad when they do.

And there can be the unspoken style preferences: tone, for example. Does the magazine or newspaper editor like it folksy and breezy or more formal, even scholarly? Does he or she prefer a pattern (like problem/ solution) or some other format in the publication you mean to write for?

One of the most valuable handouts I ever received in my college journalism courses was a list of questions to answer about the advertisements in any magazine I might want to sell to. We students had to do it for a thick stack of magazines. Here are some of the questions: Are the ads aimed at the 20-to-30-somethings? Over 50? Directed mainly toward one gender? Families? What socio-economic level? Level of education?

You might think knowing all this would be the obvious first step in writing articles for any magazine. Not so. A chief complaint from editors is that too many writers submit pieces wildly out of sync with that publication's readers. The same goes for fiction, of course. You must read—no, study!—the guidelines for the agency or publisher you aim for. And read, read, read the kind of books you want to write.
